Scintillating Chulha Chats, sessions 1 and 2, were offered in January and March, 2022 consecutively. The idea of Chulha Chats is an authentic Caribbean practice, that was creatively adapted and organized by our Professional Development Committee, chaired by Dr. Vimala Kamalodeen. The focus of these sessions involved providing a virtual forum whereby fledging and experienced mixed methods researchers and supervisors could engage in open conversations with diverse Caribbean doctoral students or recently achieved doctorates. Both sessions were highly successful, each attracting over 100 attendees. Sessions skilfully hosted/moderated by Dr. Leah Garner-O'Neale from the Cave Hill, UWI campus, who ensured that they moved beyond personal introductions and sharing of knowledge to heightened, interactive discussions of research designs, methodology, paradigmatic philosophical approaches and challenges encountered in the research process, among other things. HIGHLIGHTS OF 'CHERRIES IN THE MIX' WORKSHOP SERIES

Through the efforts of our Conference and Special Events Committee, chaired by Dr. Hunt-Anderson, the Chapter provided a diverse and exciting series of four workshops offered between January and April, 2022 These were facilitated by expert international and Caribbean MM researchers affiliated with varied educational institutions. Dr. Alison Crean and John Hitchcock, Director and Principal Researcher in educational studies respectively, at WESTAT, USA, initiated the series with a Survey Applications workshop that walked us through the avenues of developing a validated and reliable large-scale survey instrument using mixed approaches. Professors Sandra Shamroth Abrams, Elena Forzani, and Tony Onwuegbuzie of St. John's, Boston and Cambridge Universities respectively, along with an expert team, introduced us to Re-IMAGINE, a movement of new innovations and perspectives in Black methodologies in education. The third workshop, hosted by Dr. Sharon Jaggernauth of the University of the West Indies, Trinidad, and facilitated by Dr. Peggy Shannon-Baker and Dr. Ingrid Hunt-Anderson of Georgia Southern University and the University of the West Indies, Jamaica, respectively, provided new insights, with exemplars, into how a Qualitatively focused MMR study might be articulated and provide deeper understandings of the research problem or concern. To complete this 'cherries in the mix' workshop series, Drs. Elizabeth Kutscher of George Washington University and Bepyher Parey of University of the West Indies, Trinidad collaborated in teaching us the rudiments of how to develop codes, categories and themes in the qualitative component of the MMR that will also advance the integrity of the MMR process. The general consensus, 100% of feedback, was that attendees of these workshops "absolutely" wanted more!



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
